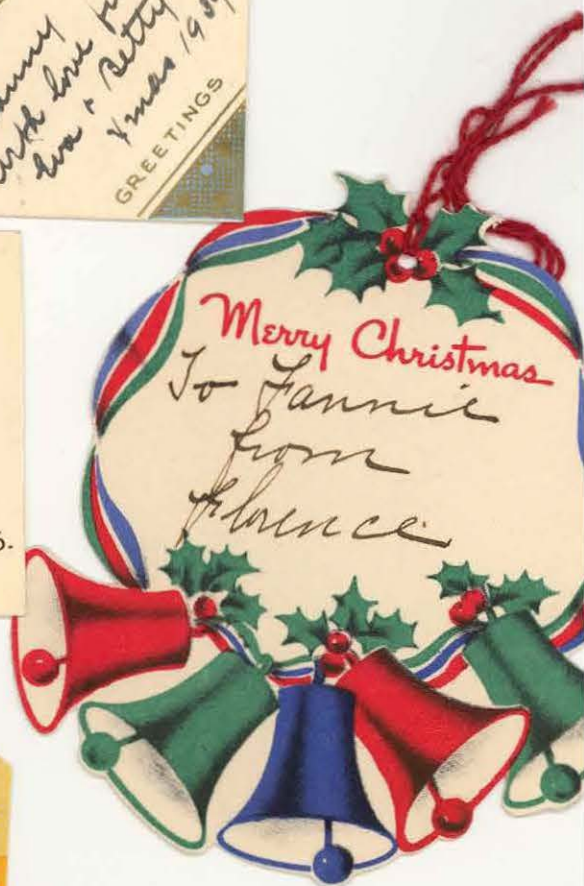



ÆNEAS JAMESON

left Ireland & came to Ontario, Canada in 1820. He left Ballinacorney County ^{Antrim} ~~Antrim~~ Ulster, Northern Ireland where he was born in 1803 and at the age of 17 crossed the ocean in sailing vessel. The voyage took 3 months to cross the Atlantic to Halifax, Nova Scotia, & later to Ontario where he was married to Miss Mary Gibson of Belfast Ireland in 1830. He built the first Hotel that was built in Galt Ontario at that period. Seven years later he moved his family to Mount Morris in the Genesee Valley in New York State USA. He moved back to Canada a few years later & settled again at Galt Ontario. He died about 1858 leaving one son married, two sons & one daughter at home. ÆNEAS the eldest, Joseph the second son 3rd son John & Sarah. He was buried in Galt Ontario (John my grandfather. Pat.) my great grandfather. C

Grandfather (ÆNEAS) was born in Galt Ontario on July 12th 1833. At the age of four years he went with his parents to Mount Morris in the Genesee Valley near Rochester New York State U.S.A. He came back to Galt some years later and was married to Elizabeth Wilson in April 1855 and came to Alberta in October 1898 living on a homestead in Spring Valley ten miles south & east of Lacombe. Moved to the Cypress District in 1909 and lived there for four years.

Went to New Westminster B.C. for a year and came back to Alberta and resided at his old home at Cypress until his death on Nov 20th 1923. He died at the ripe old age of 90 years 2 months and 8 days. He was buried in Gadsby Cemetery, Alberta.
