THE FIRST DECADE

1907 - 1916

Edmonton's development and growing economy created a need for services to support the city's swiftly increasing population. With this growth and optimism, also came homelessness, prostitution, and separated families. Institutions and organizations such as the YWCA grew to meet Edmontons, education, social, and human service needs, food, shelter, employment information, and training were the focus of the YWCA.





THE SECOND DECADE

1917 - 1926

The First World War forced advances in women's rights. Women entered the workforce in great numbers, and won the right to vote in Federal and Provincial elections. A post-war emphasis on athleticism and the outdoors led to the establishment of parks and sports facilities in Edmonton. The YWCA opened its first swimming pool and gymnasium in 1926, and organized women's camping programs at Seba Beach starting in 1916.





THE THIRD DECADE

1927 - 1936

When the Great Depression hit Edmonton, the YWCA was not exempt from its impact. Thousands of people passed through Edmonton, as they crossed the country in search of work. The agency struggled to provide meals, accommodation, and training for unemployed women and girls.





THE FOURTH DECADE

1937 - 1946

World War II returned Edmonton to prosperity. Formerly a community with an agricultural economy, the city became a strategic centre for northern military operations, including the Alaska Highway. YWCA volunteers and staff met the needs of servicemen's wives, women in the military and other women in the workforce by providing a housing registry, social clubs, meals, and for the first time, daycare.





THE FIFTH DECADE

1947 - 1956

Following the 1947 Leduc oil field discovery, Edmonton became a servicing and processing centre for the oil industry in Western Canada. The population swelled with returning servicemen and women, baby boom children, and displaced persons from Europe. The YWCA provided the latter with free accommodation, English classes and memberships. A building campaign was organized to ease the pressure on the overloaded facility.





THE SIXTH DECADE

1957 - 1966

Edmonton continued to grow rapidly, in both area and population. The community of Jasper Place was annexed, and suburbs and schools sprang up to accommodate the growing numbers of young families. Women waiting to join the very popular YWCA Mother's Day Out program had to be placed on waiting lists. Day camps for children were a big hit.





THE SEVENTH DECADE

1967 - 1976

Young people traveled across the country in large numbers, creating the "transient youth" era in the life of the YWCA. The residence was stretched to its limit and several cooperative youth hostels were developed. The YWCA opened the building on 100 Avenue, providing Edmonton with much needed sport and recreation facilities, daycare and housing for women.





THE EIGHTH DECADE

1977 - 1986

To celebrate its 75th Anniversary the YWCA crated the "Tribute to Women" awards to honor the accomplishments of Edmonton women. With city growth, also came increased need for support and counselling services. The YWCA developed many new services for women and families, which continue today. YWCA developed YoWoChAS Centre, at Lake Wabamum to provide opportunities for outdoor recreation and environmental education.





THE NINTH DECADE

1987 - 1996

A recession, combined with government cutbacks, brought unemployment and community restructuring on a larger scale than Edmonton had experienced in decades. The YWCA along with many other nonprofit organizations, institutions and businesses were forced to downsize to stay financially viable. With the growth in the economy and renewed confidence in the future, the YWCA planned new programming to meet the needs of women, and their families.

THE TENTH DECADE

1997 - 2007

The YWCA Edmonton's 10th decade sees renewed growth and vigour in the organization as it continues to remain relevant to the needs of women and their families in Edmonton. The One Woman One Vote program launches in 2001 with the aim of having more women become active in shaping the public agenda and running for public office, and a partnership with the Canadian Youth Business Foundation helps young women realize the dream of owning their own business. The International Cooperation program results in a fascinating and beneficial partnership with the YWCA of Guyana. A strong focus on women oriented, socially responsive initiatives remains the mandate of the YWCA Edmonton, with the goal of creating further equality, opportunity and choice during the next century of service.



Our Future



Over the past 100 years, the YWCA Edmonton has consistently demonstrated its ability and desire to address the changing ends of women and girls in our community. This tradition continues today as we embark in new and exciting directions aimed at shaping a world or equality, opportunity and choice for women.

In 1907, the YWCA Edmonton was formed. Under the leadership of our first president, Mrs. Thomas Bellamy, the new association assisted young women and girls who were coming to Edmonton to take part in a booming economy. Arriving at our first location on Elizabeth Street, they found a safe, comfortable place to live, assistance with job-hunting, and recreational and educational opportunities including lectures on world affairs by such notables as Emily Murphy.

While the focus of our service has broadened over the years, our centennial is a perfect opportunity to revisit our commitment to the young women of Edmonton. At the recent YWCA Canada General membership meeting in Banff, World YWCA General Secretary Musimbi Kanyoro spoke eloquently about the need for inclusion of young women at the governance level; the YWCA Edmonton is fortunate that over one-third of our board members are under 30. As well, we provide services and programs specifically geared to young women, including all-girl leadership programs through the YoWoChAs Outdoor Education Centre. Most recently, we have partnered with the Canadian Youth Business Foundation to help young women secure business loans.

I am inspired to know that by continuing to provide programs, services and leadership opportunities for young women, and by sharing with them richness of the YWCA's history, and its vast potential, we are ensuring that the YWCA will have vibrant leadership during our next century of service to the Edmonton community.

I think Mrs. Bellamy would be proud.
