REGULATIONS

Approved by Order-in-Council Under Authority of the Agricultural Societies Ordinance

1. No money shall be paid out as a prize at any exhibition unless the same has been offered in the printed list.

2. No prizes shall be awarded to any pure-bred cattle or horses at any such exhibition, unless the same are shown at halter, and led out for inspection by the judge.

3. No prize shall be awarded to any sheep or hogs at any such exhibition, unless the same are confined in pens during the exhibition.

4. No prize shall be offered at any such exhibition for any unregistered stallion, bull, ram, or boar, or their progeny under two years old.

5. Any grant or portion thereof which would otherwise be paid to any Agricultural Society or Exhibition Association may be forfeited by the Minister of Agriculture if such Society or Association permits, during the holding of any Exhibition, any gambling, objectionable games or immoral exhibit on or in the vicinity of the grounds or premises on which such exhibition is held.

6. All animals shown must be the progeny of purebred sires.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. An exhibitor making an entry by so doing agrees to the rules and regulations printed herein or afterwards to be made by the Directors for the government of the exhibition.

2. Any exhibitor not complying with the rules and regulations made to govern exhibitors and their exhibits during the exhibition may, at the discretion of the Board, forfeit all or any portion of the prize money won on his exhibits.

3. All entries must be made on the printed forms supplied for that purpose and must be received by the Secretary not later than 6 p.m. on August 10th, 1929.

4. The entry fee must in all cases be forwarded with the entry. Fees may be sent by money order, accepted cheque or bills in registered letters at risk of exhibitor: postage stamps will not be accepted.

5. No entry fee shall be charged for special prizes.

6. Each exhibitor must be the bona fide owner of the exhibit for at least thirty days before the Fair. Satis14

Two exhibitors may not combine to make a team, pen or herd entry.

- (a) No animal shall compete in more than one class or section except for harness classes and special prizes, except with permission of the Board of Directors.
- (b) Domestic Manufactures and Ladies' Work must be the work of the exhibitor or family.
- (c) All grains, roots, vegetables and grasses must be grown by the exhibitor.
- (d) No person can exhibit, unless he is a member (paid up) of the Society, or his wife, daughter, son (under 18 years) or sister. Unless this rule is observed no premium will be awarded, or if awarded will be withheld.
- 7. No claim for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted, nor writ instituted or maintained against the Society. All persons causing or permitting same shall be liable therefor.
- 8. The Directors reserve the right to remove from the ground any person, exhibit, animal, stand, or show, without assigning a reason therefor.

Delivery of Articles

- 9. All exhibits must be on the grounds and in position, and all boxes, wrappings, and other packing materials must be cleared away and everything in proper order before 10 a.m. on the opening day.
- 10. Exhibitors must provide and pay for the delivery of their articles on the exhibition grounds.

The Society cannot in any case make provision for their transportation, or be subject to any expense therefor, either in their delivery to, or return from the grounds.

- 11. Exhibitors must claim their property at the close of the Fair.
- 12. Exhibitors will at all times give the necessary personal attention to whatever they have on exhibition, and at the close take entire charge of same.
- 13. Exhibitors on arriving with their articles will apply to the director in charge, when they will be informed where the articles are to be placed.
- 14. Articles placed on exhibition must not be removed until the exhibition closes, or the hour for their removal in the prize list, except with the permission of the directors.

Livestock

- 15. All pure-bred animals must be eligible for registration. Pedigrees must be produced on demand and transfers made to the present exhibitor.
- 16. The age of horses shall date from January 1st, and the age of all other livestock from the date of birth.

Protests

17. The Directors shall have power to decide all protests and withhold prizes if they are of the opinion that it

is just to do so. They shall also have power to interpret the rules and make new rules if any printed rules do not cover any dispute or point which may be brought up. They may take action without any protest being made.

- 18. Any exhibitor making a protest must make it in writing. It must be delivered to the Secretary within four hours after the cause of the protest. A protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal, and must be accompanied by a deposit of two dollars (\$2.00), which sum shall be forfeited to the Society if the said protest be not sustained.
- 19. Protests against the Judge, on the grounds of incompetence or previous bias, may only be made in writing to the Directors in charge or the Secretary, at least one hour before the class is brought into the ring.
- 20. Should a premium be found to have been awarded or obtained in error on the part of the Judges, Clerk or any of the rules, the money will be withheld by the Board, or if paid in error same must be refunded.

Judges and Judging

- 21. If a horse be improperly classified, the Judge shall have power to order a transfer to the proper class, if said class has not already been judged. Exhibitors are therefore advised to enter in heavier class if in doubt.
- 22. In the absence of a competition in any class, or if the entry exhibited be of inferior quality, the judges may award only such prizes at their discretion, whether first, second or third or any premium. It does not follow that because a prize is offered for any particular entry that it will be awarded unless there is a proper competition, or unless the exhibit is really of merit to warrant the award being made.
- 23. Exhibitors must ascertain the order in which judging will take place and must have their exhibits ready. No complaint or appeal based on the statement that the Judges have overlooked exhibits will be considered by the Board.
- 24. All prize cards or ribbons which have been awarded must be displayed during the exhibition.
- 25. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with or influence the Judges while in the discharge of their duties, or who shall at any time on the exhibition grounds use any contemptuous or abusive language to any Judge, or within his hearing, in consequence of any award made by him, or any exhibitor refusing to accept any award made by a Judge, shall forfeit his right to any premiums to which he might otherwise be entitled and may be excluded from exhibiting thereafter.

Miscellaneous

- 26. Whenever the word "progeny" is used in livestock classes it is to be defined as referring to and meaning the direct descendant, as son or daughter.
- 27. All enquiries as to the exhibition and its arrangements should be addressed to the Secretary, Colinton, from whom all information may be obtained.

- 5. One half of all prizes won by stock transported will be retained to help defray cost of trucks. No other charge will be made for this service.

Motor Conveyance for Non-Car Owners
