but folksy

Lois Hole brings her own style to being lieutenant-governor

Lois Hole has built her life around growing plants, people, and communities.

Hole started off growing things as a child, gardening with her mother in Buchanan, Saskatchewan, and later helped start her family's St. Albert greenhouse, now one of the largest retail greenhouse operations in western Canada. She is now putting her green thumb to use – nurturing, encouraging and connecting with community – on the wider scene in her role as Alberta's 15th lieutenant-governor.

This position, to which she was recently appointed, and which is traditionally held for not less than five years, has been known for its formal protocol. That, however, is lightening as Hole's trademark good humour and charm work their magic.

Talking to Hole at the studio where this month's Edmonton Woman cover photo was taken, her hallmark traits are in evidence. The Lt-Gov.is casually yet regally perched on the edge of a rather large jacuzzi. In her comfy blouse and flowered skirt, Hole wields her curling iron as skilfully as she has dispensed gardening advice, University degrees, and speeches from the throne.

Hole smiles enthusiastically, commenting on the unusual interview setting; "Well, it's always nice to do something different!" She might be describing her position as the queen's representative, in which she plans to travel the province promoting education as the key to its future.

"Something different" also sums up the unusual path leading to her many accomplishments. In 1950 she fell in love with a young University of Alberta agricultural student, Ted Hole, when she filled in as his lastminute date for a nursing friend who got called into work.

They married, and in 1952 the couple bought a farm in St. Albert, and by 1960, through a process of trial and error, they had diversified into a vegetable and mixed garden business, originally selling produce from their back door when "people went by one day and stopped and asked if we had cucumbers to sell."

Lois Hole has grown into an expert gardener, storyteller, author, volunteer, school



trustee, board member, University chancellor, and is a member of the Order of Canada.

When asked how she fits it all in, Hole says, "I take it in stride and I try not to get caught up in the rush." About being lieutenant-governor she jokes that, "What is fascinating is that I have someone who drives me everywhere, that way I never have to worry about parking!"

She dedicated her recent book I'll Never Marry A Farmer, to Ted, 'Who helped me to discover my talents and who encouraged me to share my strengths.' "And he has recognized that in our children – the business has been turned over to the boys."

Hole was a school trustee for 31 years, and a long-time crusader for higher learning. "A good teacher creates self-esteem within young people," she says. "I've always admired people who made us feel good, who understood and showed compassion."

Although her mother was a teacher, Hole said she always told her father she wanted to be a nurse. Hole's father said, "You've got a lot of business ability." But Hole finally realized the true reason her father didn't want her to nurse. "He thought I'd see barenaked men! It was considered a bit indecent!" Hole laughs heartily.

Hole's life has not been free of challenges and tragedy. One of the toughest was her and Ted losing their first child, who died after three days. They faced crop losses due to lack of experience and two root cellars and a turkey barn burned down.

Lois encouraged Ted by taking the long view, and he would agree with her; "There's always next year." In terms of tips on longevity for a marriage, she says, "I think what you really want to do is talk together a lot."

Hole cherishes her time with husband and family. "I'm a real homebody, I get home as often a I can for a lunch with my family. I'm getting home just about as often as I used to as chancellor."

Hole also loves bringing her folksy touch to high places. Last summer she served her

With all the dinners, receptions, interviews and fanfare, part of Lois Hole's appeal is that, astonishingly, she remains the same down-to-earth person.

"Luck and good health are a wonderful combination, but you mustn't be afraid," she states. "Like it never worried me that I would have to go out and clean up the pig pens. I helped Ted, and it meant he got done faster! I never worried about doing the menial kinds of things. As a matter of fact, I kind of liked it! I hate to admit it!

"I like the practical, that's where my strength is. And that may be part of why I stay the way I am."

While the position is a change, Hole isn't worried about it making a change in her.

"Ilook at it as just being a wonderful new experience, and of course I so enjoy people. This is a part of what I'm about, "she says. "A lieutenant-governor, for goodness sake, that's what we want to do, we want to make people feel a part of this community!"

Hole, in her mid-sixties, looks forward to having more time with her community of friends and grandchildren. "And that's another thing," she laughs, "having lunch with the family every day, I never get a –" she mimes a big head! "That's right!"

In the meantime, Hole is looking forward to sitting down with Queen Elizabeth in London this fall. "I'm really excited about that," she notes. "I'll take some gardening books to her to give to Charles. I'm going to get a special dress, I can tell you! And a good pair of shoes, so I'm comfortable, but that look nice."

Who inspires this woman, a role model to women and men alike? "Enthusiastic people, children, and people who make a difference – I feel so lucky to be associated with such wonderful people!"

Hole is also excited by spring and the chance "to see things come up through the ground." She'll be at the greenhouses this summer "as much as I can!" Clearly this lieutenant-governor is staying close to her roots.



Erland Lee Award

Erland Lee made significant contributions in forming the Womens' Institute in Canada over 90 years ago. AWI office opens

There was barely a corner of floor-space left as almost 100 women crammed into the new Alberta Women's Institute office in Wetaskiwin for its grand opening, Nov. 24.

The Wetaskiwin location on 36 Ave., just south of Wetaskiwin Mall, was chosen because of its central location to the majority of members in the province.

"Our largest number of WI (Women's Institute) members are in Wetaskiwin, Camrose and the surrounding area," explained president Maxean Brigley.

Another selling feature for the Women's Institute executive in choosing their present location was the fact that the office was large enough to organize an archival area for Women's Institute artifacts.

"This seemed to be the best location because we could have a memory room with 91 years of history of the organization," Brigley said, adding that anyone doing women's studies research can use the facility. "(This information) really reflects the history of women in rural Canada."

Under the direction of Fern Killeen, the Wetaskiwin AWI office will be open every Wednesday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., along with one or two additional days which will change from week to week.

The AWI boasts 11,000 members who operate 87 branches in the province. The first Women's Institute branch in Alberta was started in 1909.

Considered by some to be the precursor of the feminist movement, Women's Institutes everywhere have dedicated themselves to improving conditions within their respective communities and provinces, reaching across the Canada and around the world.

Their mandate includes encouraging women to be progressive and well-informed, enabling them to attack injustice in society and join in a unified voice on issues from pornography and child abuse to environmental and health issues.

The nearest Women's Institute branch is Angus Ridge, with Beryl Ballhorn serving as president.

Fifty years ago, a certain item available to students in the Red Deer Composite High School dormitory had the women of the Burnt Lake Women's Institute all hot and bothered.

Was it condoms? Cigarettes? Beer? Nope, nothing of the sort.

Members of the then 27-year-old organization were outraged that students were being served — margarine.

They were shocked that pupils would be served the substitute for buter in an agricultural region like Cenral Alberta.

So, at the urging of Women's Instiute member Mrs. Frank Dallaire, the group unanimously agreed to a resoluion urging the local public school locard to ban margarine from the dornitory's cafeteria.

The resolution, reported in the Adocate in its entirety, is rather long. Suffice it to say the resolution de-

It also outlined the group's concern that butter had been replaced by margarine in a taxpayer-funded facility even though "a good deal of the rural income, which pays the board of our rural high school students, is raised from the dairy industry."

It's not clear from newspaper accounts of the day if the school board paid any heed to the Women's Institute's concerns (there appears to be no further mention of the issue in subsequent reports of the group's activities or school board meetings). It is clear, however, the women were not the only people in Central Alberta concerned about inroads margarine was making.

Vera and the word perfection, seem to go hand and hand. Whether it was teaching school or in a race she ran.


This lady is quite an artist, W.I and Guild member too. She is very active, to name just a few.



Jack and Gayle Olson of Willowdale were named winners of the Agri-Trade Farm Family Award last Wednesday.

"The Olsons are definitely deserving of this award," said Agri-Trade chairman Hugh Kellough. "They are living examples of the benefits of hard work, good business sense and a belief in the free enterprise system."

The Olsons ran one of Central Alberta's earliest feedlots and played an active role in the restructuring of the Crow freight rate in the 1980s. Jack was a founding director of the Alberta Cattle Commission, a charter member and president of the Alberta Cattle Feeders, and agricultural advisor to the Bank of Montreal. He was also a member of the Western Stock Growers.

Gayle was a founding member of the Penhold kindergarten, chaired the Normandeau Cultural and Natural History Society, and is a 35-year member of the Women's Institute and a member of the Festival of Trees committee.

The Olson farm has operated since 1941 when Jack's parents moved to the Willowdale area. Jack and his brother purchased the farm in 1978 and split it into two operations in 1987.

Group learns about environmental concerns, solutions

Environment Concerns and Solutions was the topic of Teressa Greening's presentation at the regular monthly meeting on Feb. 11. The branch convener for environment, touched upon High Tech Junk, Potable Water used for the extraction of Oil, Hydrogen Bus, Water for Healthy Bodies and Lead based Paints.

Maxus Technology Inc. of Rimbey is recycling "e-waste." In the next five years, 500 million computers will become defunct producing 1.5 billion pounds of lead from the monitors alone. Five employees collect and disburse useable material. A \$10 to \$15 recycling fee is charged to help keep the plant viable, but is of little consequence when it saves the volume that would have to go into landfills.

The Butte Action Committee near Caroline is pressing oil companies to discontinue the use of potable water in the extraction of oil. Media coverage is alerting the public to the problem of using precious water that becomes contaminated.

Winnipeg is using a Hydrogen Bus to transport its citizens. Water is the basic ingredient in the electric hydrogen fuel-cell. This prototype will help eliminate green house gases and help meet the Kyoto target.

Water is the life given source for healthy bodies. Many humans unknowingly suffer from dehydration, often as much as 75 per cent. Water keeps the body healthy preventing many types of cancer.

Although lead-based paint was banned in 1978, many buildings still contain this substance. Lead can not be absorbed though the skin but is harmful when inhaled or ingested. Lead based paint becomes hazardous with chipping or brushing and "wet cleaning" is the safest method.

Kathleen Lawrence added to the discussion by urging all members to continue with the recycling of the four litre milk jugs which are ground into pellets and in turn can be formed into flower pots, etc.

In a Minute Report, Faye Nicholson gave the long-range agriculture weather report. As of December 2002, the outlook is for a warm, dry winter which will continue the drought cycle.

President Doris Warke contributed to the Valentine theme by telling the story, Love the Second Time Around. Members made attractive cards from paper, lace, pictures, and a gold printing pen to give to their "Valentine." Heart

and Stoke receipt books are available to issue receipts for the Heart Fund card party Saturday, Feb. 22. Prizes and food are donated by the local W.I. branch for the annual community event. Marion Brown will assemble a display on Adelaide Hunter Hoodless to honour Founder's Day, Feb. 19.

Information on our twin province, Newfoundland and Labrador, will also be displayed. P.L.W.I. Calendars and Postcards will be available.

Marion Brown reported that the branch history for the Constituency has been submitted and the branch history in being completed.

Information regarding the April 26 Handicraft Tea and the May 10 Constituency Conference was presented by President Doris Warke. Registration was paid for the March 20 District Workshop in Bashaw.

The roll call was answered by bringing containers for the food bank, used Christmas cards for Michener Centre, and suggestions for rising money for the Lorgot ACWW project as well as expressing a personal Kyoto plan. These included: turning down the thermostat at night, banning bath sheets, air drying laundry, eliminating extensive car idling, walking instead of driving and refusing to buy over packaged items.







They interacted with the people as they enjoyed the hospitality at their many Bed and Breakfasts.

Millie Munro, Health Convener, gave a minute minder on healthy blood pressure. Life style, exercise, nutrition and stress all effect blood pressure. She urged members to have a regular blood pressure reading taken.

Members each contributed \$4.50 for Pennies for Friendship which is the life blood of the world body, Associated Women of the World.

Coal Bed Methane (CBM) was the subject of Agriculture and Canadian Industries Co-chairmen, E. Marion Brown and Faye Nicholson at the Pine Lake Women's Institute November meeting.

Methane gas is extracted from coal beds by pumping all the water from the coal seam thus reducing the pressure that binds the gas to the coal. The methane is then free to flow from the coal through the well to the surface. It can take one to two years of pumping water before maximum gas production is reached.

Test holes are becoming common in the Central Alberta area and only when there is sufficient producing wells for a pipeline network will the wells be in production. Farmers are urged to take precautions to protect


Upcoming plans for the organization were presented to the branch through the AWI provincial newsletter and representation at the constituency meeting.


and the branch donation of twenty-one dozen will be put on cookie plates for Meals on Wheels. This constituency project has been carried out for several years.

Ironically the guest speaker for the evening was Dwayne Hillman, a volunteer who had spent seven days on the eastern coast of Nicaragua in late January 2004 distributing Christmas boxes to children. Kathleen Lawrence, educational convener for Social Services introduced Mr. Hillman who joined twenty-two other participants in ponga boats delivering the precious boxes to nine villages. A survey is done by local churches to asses the needs and ages of children in each village. Mr. Hillman said they were able to give every child a box because of the generosity of Canadians. Over six and one half million were prepared in Canada with over 300,000 boxes coming out of the Calgary depot. The group which included a medical team were able to bring love, hope and encouragement to an under privileged country.

Although the February meeting was cancelled because of a snow storm, members have been busy. Five ladies met on March fourth to assemble twenty-two "quilt pockets" readied by Doris Warke. These will be used at the FWIC 2006 Convention to carry name tags, meal tickets etc.

A garden club will again be sponsored by the Pine Lake Women's Institute for the district children this summer.







On December 9th, 1999, Prime Minister Jean Chretien, appointed successful businesswoman, best selling author, education advocate and community supporter, Lois Elsa Hole as Alberta's 15th Lieutenant Governor. She is the second woman in Alberta's history to serve as Lieutenant Governor.

Born and raised in Buchanan, Saskatchewan, Her Honour moved to Edmonton in her early teens and completed her secondary education at Strathcona Composite High School.

Widow of the late, Ted Hole, she has two sons: Bill and Jim and three grandchildren.

She and her husband, Ted bought a mixed farm in St. Albert which they diversified into a vegetable and mixed garden business. In 1979 the farm was incorporated as Hole's Greenhouses & Gardens Ltd. and their sons joined the business full-time. It has since grown into one of the largest retail greenhouse operations in western Canada

Her Honour served as a school trustee for the St. Albert School District #6 from 1981 to the fall of 1998. She previously served, for fourteen years, as a trustee and chairperson for the Sturgeon School Division and, for eleven years, as a member of the Athabasca University Governing Council. Her Honour has served as a director of the Farm Credit Corporation and as Honourary Chair for the 27th Canadian Congress on Criminal Justice and for the Children's Millennium Fund. She also served as a board member of the Canadian Heritage Garden Foundation, the Child & Adolescent Services Association and the Quality of Life Commission.

As Chancellor of the University of Alberta, Her Honour served as the titular head of the University, chairing all Senate meetings, serving as a member of the Board of Governors, representing the University at all ceremonial occasions and presiding over convocation to confer all degrees.

Her Honour is the author of six gardening books (all Canadian bestsellers) and a collection of life stories, photographs and growing information entitled "I'll Never Marry a Farmer". In the past, she has been a regular contributor to the Globe and Mail, Edmonton Journal, and the Edmonton Sun, and was the writer of the Canadian portion of the 1999 Old Farmer's Almanac Gardening Companion. She has appeared regularly on the "Grapevine" segment of CBC TV's Canadian Gardener.

In 1983, Her Honour was awarded an honourary doctorate from Athabasca University and in 1997 received a Distinguished Citizen Honourary Diploma in Business from Grant MacEwan Community College. In 1995 she was named as both Edmonton Business and Professional Woman of the Year and as St. Albert's Citizen of the Year. In 1999 she was appointed a Member of the Order of Canada. The University of Alberta awarded her a Honourary Doctorate of Laws in the year 2000. She was recently awarded the Gandhi, King, Ikeda Humanitarian Award (2003). She has been recognized by the military and most recently was bestowed an "Honourary Patricia" by the 1st Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

The Lieutenant Governor has been recognized for her ongoing contributions to libraries, education and the arts by the establishment of The Lois Hole Library Legacy Program (2002), The Alberta School Boards "Lois Hole Lecture Series" (2003) and the Lieutenant Governor of Alberta Arts Awards Program (2003).

Her Honour serves as Honourary Patron to numerous organizations. She was installed as Alberta's Lieutenant Governor on February 10th, 2000.

Alberta Women's Institutes get fund-

A recent provincewide fundraising project has helped build interest in one of oldest women's organizations in Alberta.

"Yes, membership is declining, unfortunately," said Blanche Cunningham, at the opening of the Alberta Women's Institutes annual convention at the Red Deer Lodge on Tuesday.

"The quilt project was a great booster, because it got people working and doing things," she added.

Cunningham, of the Cottonwood Women's Institute west of Innisfail, and District 5 Director of the Alberta Women's Institutes, said each member of the province's various WI branches was challenged to create a quilt block to be used in building quilts to be sold.

The resulting income is to help fund the 2006 national convention, which is also to be held in Red Deer.

There are about 72 branches in Al-

"I was expecting about 100," said Cunningham of the quilt blocks.

Instead, 395 were produced, enough to make about dozen quilts.

It meant a steep learning curve for many of the women who answered the challenge.

She talked about the province's insurance legislation where the payout for minor injuries, defined by Jablonski as strains, sprains and softtissue injuries, including whiplash, has been capped at \$4,000.

Jablonski discussed the province's efforts to defeat family violence and described a project running in Calgary where all those affected, including spouses, children, lawyers and a judge, meet at a table rather than a courtroom in an attempt to work things out

Jablonski also handed out a little advice to the assembly, some of whom kept busy knitting while she talked

"It's not selfish to look after yourself, it's an absolute necessity," she said

If you ignore your own needs you could find yourself unable to care for your family, she added.

Other speakers at the convention included Darlene Hallett, Linda Finstad, and Noreen Olson. Darlene spoke of a twomonth farm exchange with family from New Zealand. Linda demonstrated how recycled articles could be used to make clothing. She owns "Hats by Emmanuel" a business that makes and sells hats for cancer patients who have undergone chemotherapy. Closing speaker Noreen Olson local author who read from her new book "The School Bus Doesn't Stop Here Anymore."

One of the highlights of the sessions was the banquet on Wednesday night where awards were given out for Creative Writing and Handicraft. Everyone enjoyed the entertainment provided by Chatelaine of Innisfail and Chelsea Simms local pianist.

meeting. The leading problem in our Canadian society is the BSE problem with the discovery of the first case on May 20, 2003. Auctions, which were halted, have still not resumed their normal operations. Retail of beef has been down even with the strong support shown by the general population. For farmers anti depressants are up. It is recognized there must be an increase in meat packing facilities. Scientists are working on a break

though in BSE testing that can be accurate and timely. As for disposal of carcasses, the "digester" process operates more cheaply and breaks down the prions making them harmless. Elk and sheep farmers have also been affected by BSE problem and chronic wasting disease. 19 million chickens had to be slaughtered affecting 25 farms because of the Avian Flu.

Farmers are also concerned about the environment and the expansion of industry such as coal bed methane on their agricultural lands. One final item of good news expressed by Ms. Nicholson was that honeybees can be trained to find land mines. Sugar is mixed with explosives and the bees zoom in on mine locations recognizing this odor.





A quilt stitched together by the Cottonwood Women's Institute near Innisfail is to hang in the provincial legislative building to help mark Alberta's centennial.

. The individual blocks that make up the quilt were crafted by members of Women's Institutes from all over Alberta.

In addition to the blocks that went into the centennial quilt, enough blocks were created to make a total of 19 quilts, said Blanche Cunningham of the Cottonwood Women's Institute.

Besides the quilt celebrating Alberta's first century, the rest of the quilts were created as a fundraising effort because next year Alberta is to play host to the organization's national convention.

An official presentation of the centennial quilt will be made to Innisfail-Sylvan Lake MLA Luke Ouellette on Feb. 19 at the Cottonwood-Gordon Hall Feb. 19, it just so happens, is known as Founder's Day in the Women's Institute calendar, because it was on that day in 1897 that the first Women's Institute was established in Stoney Creek. Ont.

The organization had spread to Alberta by 1909.

Cunningham said the quilt blocks in the special quilt cover Alberta's 100-year history.

There's everything from Alberta's coat of arms and Alberta's Women's Institute crest and motto "for Home and Country," to early horse power, an oil well pumping in a canola field, the modern tractor, hand-milking, the farm kitchen including kitten and puppy, a schoolhouse, grain elevators and more.

The techniques used to create the blocks include quilting, piecing, embroidery, cross-stitching, appliqué and photo-transfer.

The quilt is to hang in the legislature for as long as it is needed, said Cunningham.

After that, the stipulation is that it be returned.

The washing and drying process is usually carried out by the men. 2005 is the year of MICRO CREDIT and Fair Trade is an example of a system that nutually benefits relationships between producers, distributors and consumers. Producers of coffee in Central America can receive a fair price if consumers purchase directly from them.

Bridgehead is an alternative trading organization that links Canadians with farmers and artisans in the developing world through Fair Trade. These purchases make a global difference helping to fight poverty. Fair trade coffee can be purchased at the Red Deer & District Museum.



"Kimako". World women will support this Tanzanian project to promote health and education for child survival.



Her body produces its own insulin although anti rejection drugs will have to be taken life long. Another islet transplant may be necessary in the future.

The keynote speaker of the Kneehill Constituency Conference was Lindsay Parker. As a fifteen year old student she had traveled with a student group to the Antarctic.

She supported her presentation with slides and emphasized the need to keep the region in its pristine state. In addition Marion Brown and Doris Warke enjoyed the outstanding display of handicraft, baking, photography and plants and W.I. hospitality.

Final preparations were made for the upcoming 50th Anniversary branch celebration and Constituency handicraft tea.

The branch will again sponsor the children's garden club.

Samaritan's Purse Christmas Boxes was the program topic for the October meeting of the Pine Lake Women's Institute. Priscilla Riemer told her story of personally delivering the Canadian boxes to Nicaragua in 2000 and later to Costa Rica. The Christmas boxes are stored in a warehouse in Calgary,


Climate Change— Are you doing your bit? " in this International Polar Year. Shrinking artic ice, northern ice shelves collapsing into the sea, the threat to




